#### Curator's Corner



One of the paintings under consideration for next year's planned Thomas Churchyard exhibition is this scene of a watermill. Can anyone help us to identify its location? It is one of at least three views of the same mill to have been painted by Churchyard, most of whose work was inspired by scenes close to where he lived in Woodbridge and Melton.

The mill building has a tiled roof and white weather-boarded walls upon a brick base. The waterwheel appears to be internal to the building, perhaps undershot, and the volume of water in the tail race emerging from the arched culvert seems

relatively small. There may have been a millpond situated behind the building. There is the suggestion of a mill house behind the trees to the left of the mill.

As all Woodbridgians know, some mills have very long lives and distinctive profiles. Others nestle in the landscape, half-hidden by trees. Their sites may become industrialised. Some lose their original function and become family homes. A few are demolished and are known only from documentary sources or old photographs. Who can tell us more about the fate of this mill? If you think you can, please contact me.
